Dr. Anita Ho, Ph.D., is Assistant Professor in the W. M. Young Centre for Applied Ethics at the University of British Columbia and Ethicist at Providence Health Care. She has published in various areas of bioethics, and is currently working on

a book-length manuscript on trust and autonomy in clinical and research medicine, supported by a research grant from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada.



Dr. Bashir Jiwani, Ph.D., is Ethicist & Director of Fraser Health Ethics Services. He works in ethics-based organizational policy and infrastructure. His publications include: An Introduction to Health Ethics Committees: a Professional

Guide for the Development of Ethics Resources and Ethics and Health Resource Allocation: A Primer for Policy Makers.



Dr. Bethan Everett, MBA, Ph.D., is an ethics consultant at Vancouver Coastal Health Authority and Children's and Women's Hospital. Bethan also is a Clinical Assistant Professor for the Faculty of Medicine, Department of Physical Therapy at The University of British Columbia and a Clinical Instructor at the Boucher Institute of Naturopathic Medicine.



Dr. Brendan Leier, Ph.D., is the Clinical Ethicist at the University of Alberta and Stollery Children's Hospitals, and Clinical Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Medicine and Dentistry at the University of Alberta. Dr. Leier's current research

focuses on the role of compassionate care in medicine, the communication of risk, and care at the end of life.



Ms. Camille Ciarniello, BSN, LLB, is the Director of Risk Management and Patient Safety for Providence Health Care. Camille has developed a patient safety program with a focus on just culture and accountability that

encourages the adoption of evidence based best practices in high-risk areas, and seeks to improve communication at all levels of care.
